- SureStart thumbs up
- Education for disadvantaged 2 and 3 year olds / social mobility
- 4200 health visitors
- Investment in troubled families
- Improving parenting
- Public heath

Day care works: impact



Huge evidence base from research and OFSTED

- Social skills
- Learning
- Language/reasoning
- Interaction
- Impact increases with quality
- Impact improvement
 - Reading, numeracy, science, through primary
- 14 year old study
 - Impact less but statistically significant

Reshaping children's centres



Family Action Centres: in addition to core services:-

- Family support, parental outreach
- Job centres and work skills
- Work with young families
- Work with fathers
- Partnerships with health visitors/midwives
- Parenting support
- Credit unions
- Financial advice
- Relationship support, summer schemes, ie. targeted support in universal setting
- Better use of buildings reaching to 18

Health: keeping the focus



- Services for children moving to LA and public health
- FNP works but targeted at small numbers
- Practice varies hugely in focus
- We like midwives, HV, speech and language therapists etc

Families with complex needs



- Parent focus
- Enduring mental health problems
- Post natal depression
- Learning difficulties
- Substance misuse
- Chaotic families

Families with complex needs



- Children's centres not reaching this small group
- Not very good at reaching families with children under 1
- Different needs, different services
- Children at risk developmentally, educationally, socially, cognitively


Why should we be concerned



- 1. Earlier you intervene the better
- 2. Greatest impact in early years
- 3. Midwives, health visitors and early years workers know who so many families with complex needs are.

Impact of <u>acquired</u> parental difficulties on children



1. Post-natal depression

2. Mental health difficulties

3. Substance abuse (<1% of CPPs)

4. Domestic abuse (under-reported)

Prevents attachment, affects mother/child and inter-parent relationships

Affects parenting capacity, recovery can be slow, significant impact on child/young carers

Children often neglected, deeply impoverished, emotional and physical neglect

Affects ability and confidence to parent. Emotional and physical impact on children.

Impact of *inbuilt* parental difficulties on children



Lack of knowledge/experience

No family/partner/local friends to consult/help

Learning difficulties

Chaotic lifestyle/no natural parenting aptitude

Benefit from parenting classes

Need support and reassurance

Need help throughout childhood. High % of children placed in care.

Period of family support

•Serious impact on child wellbeing/health/school attendance/lack of control/children no respect

•High cost, high harm families.

- •Need long term support
- •High % children care proceedings

Importance of Perinatal period -9 to 24 months

What could go wrong

Untreated post-natal depression can impact parent-child attachment

Childbirth places pressure on family finances and relationships

Likelihood of domestic violence increases during pregnancy

Neuroscience tells us first two years are crucial to personality formation

New babies most vulnerable to abuse

Intervention cycle: linking to early years child aged 2-5 years

Parental capacity and poor environment can impact on speech and motor skills Parents can become isolated and lose skills, which impacts on relationship to children and future prospects

Parents with capacity issues may lose children to care system

Creative play crucial to motor skill and speech development

families

Socialisation in preparation for school Input in children's centres can help address deficits in poor home environments Intensive support now can help address issues in home environment in time for starting school

Family Support

Made the case – how to achieve change



- Midwives and health visitors have huge workloads and are an expensive resource
- Families with complex needs require time and support to make changes
- Solution: work together for families with complex needs

Home based support

- Service needed in own home
- Requires 6 months to 1 year
- Expensive @ 4,000 per family
- High risk of family breakdown
 - Neglect / abuse
 - Parental hospitalisation
- Ready to attend centres at end of programme

Mansfield model



- Family support workers attached to HV all co-located in children's centre
- HV diagnoses concerns and we agree a plan
- Family support workers visit and work with families on the range of issues, HV monitor
- Typically a range of issues weaning, poor diet, hygiene, poverty, housing,
 ^{supdefine families since 1869} development milestones, DV, relationship¹⁸


It works



- Better use of resources FSW paid 15k less. FSW less threatening to parents
- HV remains key worker and responsible
- Parents focus on needs on children
- Families supported to make change
- Work on inter-related range of issues

Family Action: Perinatal Services



- Reliant on FNP targeted at a few
- PND huge problem, significant impact on children – need a continuum of care
- Developed with Maudesley now run 5 pilot projects, evaluated by Warwick
- One paid worker to assess referrals from midwives, recruit and manage volunteers
- Volunteers work from pregnancy to 1 year old supporting families since 1869

Conclusions



Investing in Parenting- Early intervention cost effective

- Evidence based and it works
- Need to invest in range of perinatal services
- Children's Centres to engage better with fathers, families children under one
- HV / midwives need to work with family support workers to affect change in families with complex needs
